OVERVIEW

A busy, challenging and important year for our Association as we hosted the first Federal Conference in South Australia for 19 years. A small subcommittee of Heather Southcott, Sheila Hill, Rosemary McKay and Ricky Lee worked very hard under difficult circumstances. We received donations from ;Newmont Mining; UNAA ;Lord Mayor; Fuji Xerox and Lina Caporosa

We are still challenged financially to meet our increasing costs. We have increased our membership fees by a modest amount. We are seeking to increase our membership ,to raise funds and to receive donations and sponsorships.

We acknowledge the financial support we receive from the State Government ,in the form of a small grant and a rent subsidy.

We provide funds for encouragement grants to disadvantaged groups to enable them to take part in events during Children's Week. This is made possible through a grant from the Norman Percy Cole Trust

We received donations of \$265 in memory of our former librarian Mrs Kath Fuller; we have bought books for the library.

PRESIDENT'S REPORT JUNE 2002 -MAY 2003

Preamble

Once again I would like to begin my report by thanking those who have so constantly supported this committee during the past year and especially those who undertook temporary duties during my absences - both expected and unexpected. The members of this committee are all very involved in other works and their continued presence at meetings and the fact that they all rise to every occasion has been remarkable.

It has been a quieter year but the main purpose of this committee - imparting information and supporting the activities of women's organisations in the city has been well covered. We did not choose a particular focus this year but have acted or reacted to issues as they have arisen.

As I mentioned this time last year, our membership had declined and this has again been the case. However, it is certainly still an active committee and we are at present planning a further mail out of invitations - to past and prospective members - for our Annual General Meeting in August.

Speakers

Tammy Franks from the YWCA gave a bright talk on their campaign - "Be real - No Body's Perfect - to encourage young women to accept their body image

Trafficking in Women - in Asia

Irene Rozario, Assistant Director of the Caritas Development Institute in Bangladesh was our guest speaker at an open meeting in March. She has the responsibility of implementing the South Asian Regional Program on the prevention of trafficking in women and children and gave a very information - and sad talk on the current situation and the remedies being tried. Although the talk was widely advertised only four visitors attended

Northfield Women's Prison

Our watching brief over the prison continued this year and at our annual visit we were pleased to see some improvements to the educational facilities. However, the unit is still overcrowded, remand and sentenced prisoners are still held together and medical systems still inadequate. The newly appointed prisoner liaison officer has brought a better rapport between prisoners and staff. The library had great shelving but few books and small televisions used for rewards too few. Through the members of our organisation we put out a call and the Adelaide Soroptimist Club and Catholic Women's League both donated a new television and a third was bought from our committee funds. These were delivered in time for Christmas together with 9 large boxes of books for the library. We again wrote to the relevant government departments with regard to the urgency for a new prison. It is noted that this is again on the Agenda for this year - as a government/private enterprise partnership endeavour and we will keep reminding them.

National Conference of the United Nations Association of Australia

Heather Southcott of this committee, who is also President of UNAA SA, and myself were very involved on the small organising team for this conference and there was considerable work in August and September. The Conference was a great success and the Dinner took the form of an Afghani Feast cooked by the families with whom I have been working for three years now. All members of the committee were a great support in many ways.

WomenSpeak Consortium

UNAA Status of Women Committees nationally (actually ourselves and Victoria at this stage) are participants in the WomenSpeak Consortium coordinated by the YWCA. This one of the four vehicles by which women are able to communicate with the Federal Office of the Status of

Women and apply for funding under the arrangements put in place over the last two years. Dianne Alley of UNAA SOW Victoria is classed as our National Convenor on Status of Women issues and is now keeping us well informed. **Heather Southcott** attended the last conference held in Canberra as part of the UNAA delegation of three. There is actually little we can do here and we understand that the arrangements are about to change again and it has been noted that the advertisements for funding applications have already appeared in the national press. We await developments - but not with baited breath!

Website – on the UNAA-SA site.



In 1999, the General Assembly of the United Nations designated 2002 as the International Year of Ecotourism. The idea was partly to recognise the economic and social benefits arising from eco-tourism and its role in the promotion of cultural understanding of the environment.

The theme of the 2002 Federal Conference focuses on the role that ecotourism plays in Australia in promoting cultural understanding and international perspectives, in that it is possible to promote understanding of global and cultural diversity through different environmental experiences, especially in the context of ecotourism.

The Federal Conference will devote the morning sessions of the program to presentations and performances on Aboriginal ecotourism initiatives, especially in South Australia. This part of the program is coordinated by the Tandanya Institute jointly with UNAA.

The afternoon program is devoted to international issues, with speakers and panel discussions to address international issues in the context of a global community.

The annual *Evatt Memorial Lecture* is to be given at the Conference Dinner by Professor Margaret Reynolds, UNAA Federal President, featuring a buffet of traditional Afghan foods.

CHARTER OF THE UNITED NATIONS

We, the peoples of the United Nations determined

- to save succeeding generations from the scourge of war,
which has brought untold sorrow to mankind, and
- to reaffirm faith in fundamental human rights, in the dignity
and worth of the human person, in the equal rights of men
and women and of nations large and small, and
- to establish conditions under which justice and respect for
the obligations arising from treaties and other sources of
international law can be maintained, and
- to promote social progress and better standards
of life in larger freedom...

And to these ends

- to practise tolerance and live together in peace with
one another as good neighbours, and
- to unite our strength to maintain international
peace and security, and
- to ensure, by the acceptance of principles and the
institution of methods, that armed force shall not be
used, save in the common interest, and
- to employ international machinery for the promotion of
the economic and social advancement of all peoples
