Annual General Meeting (17th July 2016)

At the annual general meeting of the United Nations Association of Australia, South Australia Division the special guests were Dr Lynn Arnold and Mr Matt Kronborg, Executive Director of the United Nations Association of Australia at the National level.

With retirement of John Crawford, Lidia Moretti was elected to the office of President unopposed. Lidia has not only served the division well as Vice President, but also at the National level as a National Vice President and more recently as a National Board member with the restructuring of the National body in 2014. Lidia has consistently taken a leading role in the organisation of the UN Day Dinners, the proceeds from which are vital to the continuation of our current operation. Lidia has been able to give our division a notably high profile through a number of UN related activities such the World Humanitarian Day Lunch, and especially this year with Yoga Harmony Day in the South Parklands.

UNAA's collaborations with surrealist Andrew Baines has brought to life memorable activities involving important South Australians in celebrating The year of the Farmer ,celebrating the UN's 70th Birthday at Henley Beach and collaborating with the Peace Bottle project largely achieved through Lidia's persistent endeavours.

On her election Lidia commented that she saw the future as "building on our strengths" with community engagement to the fore as happened in the case of Yoga Day in collaboration with Dru Yoga and the World Peace Flame.

Keeping in mind activities in relation to the International Year Of Pulses, the assistance from the food industry and the food program at Kilkenny Primary School, it was interesting to note that South Australia was mentioned on the FAO website.

Our partnerships with the Adelaide City Council and Port Adelaide Enfield City Council were emphasised as positive achievements along with the need for fundraising, of which the UN Day Dinner to be held on the 13 th November this year, would be a key event whose success would rely on effective teamwork.

Matt Kronborg, who was warmly greeted on his second visit to South Australia in recent months, congratulated the new committee and spoke about some of the challenges ahead, welcoming the renewal of Federal Government funding for the UNAA through the Department of Foreign and Trade. For its part, UNAA is encouraged to promote the Australia's collaboration with UN programs and foreign aid contributions. Matt noted that there are 80 active United Nations associations around the world, dating back to 1947 UNAA SA achievements over the previous twelve months are comprehensively documented in our annual report, copies of which are readily available on-line.

World Humanitarian Day (25th August 2016)

Rev Dr Lynn Arnold, who was invited to read the UN Secretary General's message for World Humanitarian Day, revealed that his daughter was working in a needy African community. Lynn shared her compassion with us and explained that World Humanitarian Day was not simply about the people his daughter were working with but also people with commitment like his daughter.



Some of the distinguished guests at the Humanitarian Day Dinner, including Robyn Layton, Lynn Arnold, Jing Lee, Amanda Blair, the head of the Department of Foreign Affairs and Trade (sponsors of the dinner), Gary Johansen, Mayor of Port Adelaide Enfield, Lidia Moretti, newly elected president of UNAA SA.

Dr Robyn Layton, former Justice of the Supreme Court, as guest speaker, addressed the 2016 Humanitarian Day theme of "one humanity" with a focus on youth and multicultural communities. Robyn reflected on our lack of humanity in condemning eligible refugees to indefinite detention on Manus and Nauru and placing children there in psychologically damaging situations. Compere Amanda Blair, clearly expressed her view as to how shameful the refugee situation really was.

In thanking Lynn and Robyn for their contributions Lidia complimented Robyn's mother *on encouraging* her to have so much empathy towards all people, even those whom one may like least.



A father and son musical duo, Farid Drokhsh and his son, provided a most enjoyable interlude in proceedings, emphasising the multicultural theme for World Humanitarian Day. Messages were prepared for the Peace Bottle, in the background. Two students from Kilkenny Primary school were invited to present their messages first. In addition, as part of a grant from the Norman Percy Cole Bequest, scholarships were presented to two TAFE students to make a small contribution towards their studies.

UN Peacekeepers Service (18th September 2016)

Regarding the UN Peacekeepers' Service on 18 September, the UNAASA was again represented at the ADF Peacekeepers' Day Peacekeeping Commemorative Service at the National War Memorial on North Terrace.

UNAA SA members and friends were invited to join the South Australian Peacekeepers Sub-Branch of the RSL SA to remember those who have died while serving overseas on UN Peacekeeping missions since 1950.

We joined the various service and other organisations in laying a wreath in their memory. President Col. Steve Larkins welcomed those present followed by Chaplain Rev. Carl Aiken with prayers. Col. Annette Summers gave a scripture reading. Particularly moving was the address given by Brevit Sargeant Geoff Parker, Commonwealth Police, telling of the tragic loss of PSO Adam Dunning, serving with the RAMSI mission to the Solomon Islands, who lost his life on 22 December 2004. This was followed by the call of the honour roll, the Ode the Last Post, concluding with the benediction.

Among many community achievements, Heather was for many years president of the United Nations Association of Australia South Australian Division. The Adelaide Council recently approved for a plaque to be placed with those along North Terrace in memory of her contribution to the South Australian community. Being located next to Helen Spence, who was as committed to women's right as was Heather, seems most appropriate.

UN Day Dinner (1st November 2016)

The UN Day Dinner has become the highlight event of our year and our main Fundraiser. The new National President of UNAA, Major General (Retd) Mike Smith, was among the special guests.



The National Wine Centre helped to create a most enjoyable evening which the dinner a very successful event. Our many generous sponsors, providing food, wine and prizes, cannot be thanked enough for their wonderful contribution to the enjoyment and success of the evening. The musicians from the Golonka band provided gypsy style rhythms that expressed how Adelaide has become one of UNESCO's cities of music.

Amorelle Dempster – Guest Speaker



Amorelle began her talk by referring to Carlo Petrini, the head of the world Slow Food Movement, who said that the shame of hunger should be defeated in this generation. This is in keeping with the United Nations Sustainable Development Goals to eliminate poverty and hunger by 2030.

Slow Food is a global movement that supports Biodiversity. Amorelle explained that for the past 30 years the movement has warned against the continual loss of local food traditions, noting that the Slow Food Movement uses a Snail for its logo, indicating that it is the opposite to fast food. Amorelle referred to the right to quality food and the need for responsible consumption, which means eating all parts of the animal.

As a resident of Maitland, Amorelle explained that her home was in the Hunter Valley where the Slow Food Movement was quite active but she added that there were similar groups Australia wide, including Adelaide Barossa. Amorelle noted that Aboriginal foods are also being lost and reminded us how carefully Indigenous Australians managed the land.

Famous for their pumpkins, the Hunter Valley farmers just recently faced a crisis as one hundred tonnes of pumpkins was about to be ploughed into the ground. The community response in support of the local farmers was a pop-up stall in the centre of Maitland run by volunteers who sold over 2000 pumpkins in one day! Support for local farmers is a slow food goal.

SOS: Save our Seas Celebrating World Ocean Day on the Beach (13th December 2016)

The Guest Speaker at the 2017 Adelaide IWD Breakfast was the former Australian Prime Minister, Julia Gillard. Julia's remarks related to her work with teenage girls in Malawi where she was accompanied by the pop singer Rhianna. Julia Gillard described how poverty hurts more in a globalised world. The world's poorest are more aware of their poverty because of the use of new technology and globalisation. Ms Gillard was recounting a trip to the African nation of Malawi in her capacity as chairwoman of the Global Partnership for Education.

"Girls' education is so important, not only for their own empowerment but for the broader wellbeing of their families and their nations."

Ms Gillard revealed the organisation would seek more funding from around the world later this year to help improve the situation.

Yoga Day, Adelaide 2017 (29th April)



On a mild autumn day in the spirit of Peace and Harmony, an event was held to celebrate Harmony Day combined with the International Yoga Day. This was sponsored by the United **Nations** Association (SA), the UNAA Peace Program, the World Peace Flame and Dru Yoga. The mild Autumn weather and the picturesque setting certainly added to the atmosphere for this event. MC Amanda Blair gave the Welcome to Kaurna Country. She then explained the significance of the event in the following words:

"We are here to celebrate Harmony Day which was on March 21^{st.} It's about inclusiveness, respect and a sense of belonging for everyone. It is a day for all Australians to embrace cultural diversity and to share what we have in common. The central message for Harmony Day is that 'everyone belongs', reinforcing the importance of inclusiveness to all Australians. The United Nations Association of Australia, SA Division, the UNAA Peace Program in conjunction with the World Peace Flame and Dru Yoga, have organised this occasion to bring together the concept of Harmony and Peace, together with the UN International Yoga Day which was celebrated for the first time 2 years ago on 21 June 2015."



Our Patron for Yoga Day, the Lady Mayoress of Adelaide, Genevieve Theseira-Haese, welcomed our honoured guests Rachel Sanderson MP, Member for Adelaide, Danyse Crotti from Dru Yoga, Ruth Rohan Jones our Yoga instructor, the Artist Andrew Baines and the Monks and Congregation of the Zhulin Buddhist Temple. And from Yorketown Area School for the second time in succession, we were joined by a group of students, teachers and parents who had come a long way for this occasion.

Amanda Blair then introduced the Buddhist Monks for the blessing. The Monks were led by the Abbot, The Venerable Jie Wen Shi of The South Australian Buddhist Association. Following the blessing, Amanda Blair spoke about the Peace Bottle which provided part of the backdrop to the event, as a concept developed from an idea by artist Andrew Baines and planned to be sent to New York soon together with Peace messages from the community and schools. The Lady Mayoress then received the World Peace Flame which was in Adelaide for the second time, as it is being held at Yorketown Area School. It was lit for the first time in Adelaide last year at the Yoga Day event and then at the United Nations Dinner in November of 2016.


large to line up along the coast dressed in all black attire & top hats, while gazing on to the horizon, to symbolise a sombre mood and that we are close to the end.

Discussion Evenings

Update on East Timor. Dr. Richie Gun. East Timor Update (17th May 2016)



We were delighted to have Dr Richie Gun update us on progress in East Timor since they achieved independence. While Indonesian fertility has more than halved between 1962 and 2012, in East Timor it only fell by 20%. However this is an area where Richie is working in the villages, and he says that while there is a good programme in place,

there is cultural resistance to be overcome. Mortality is improving. During the time the UN peacekeeping

activities were working in East Timor there were large numbers of Cuban doctors working in East Timor. This has now resulted in a large number



of East Timorese medical workers being Cuban trained. Education presents a challenge, not helped by Portuguese being the official language since independence (it was Indonesian during the occupation). Apart from local languages, the more common spoken language is Tetum Richie said it is a safe place to visit.

Sustainable Development Goals Discussion Evening (19th July 2016)



The goals can be summarised by looking at the Five Ps. These are: people, planet, prosperity, peace and partnership.

People – to end poverty and hunger, in all their forms and dimensions and to ensure that all human beings can fulfil their potential in dignity, equality and in a healthy environment. (Goal 1, 2, 3, 4, 5 and 6)

Prosperity - to ensure that all human beings can enjoy prosperous and fulfilling lives and that economic, social and technological progress occurs in harmony with nature. (Goal 7, 8, 9, 10 and 11)

Planet - to protect the planet from degradation, including through sustainable consumption and production, sustainably managing its natural resources and taking urgent action on climate change, so that it can support the needs of the present and future generations. (Goal 12, 13, 14 and 15)

Peace - to foster peaceful, just and inclusive societies free from fear and violence. There can be no sustainable development without peace and no peace without sustainable development. (Goal 16) Partnership - to mobilize the means required to implement this agenda through a revitalised global partnership for sustainable development, based on a spirit of strengthened global solidarity, focused in particular on the needs of the poorest and most vulnerable and with the participation of all countries, all stakeholders and all people. (Goal 17)

Safe Ground (16th August 2016)

Our August Discussion Evening with Helen Stanger. Recognising that while the UN had agreed to ban the use of these weapons, the ongoing deaths and injuries caused by the remnant weapons from past conflicts the new name "Safe Ground" was adopted as offering a more accurate portrayal of the goals of the organisation. This was reinforced by the publication of the book "In Search of Safe Ground" highlighting the problems faced by villagers in Cambodia displaced by the war returning to their homes. With the help of a bequest and funding from DFAT, the book highlighted the danger of these remaining weapons to the civilian population trying to return to their homes, graphically showing how the name change to Safe Ground focussed on the dangers from degrading land mines, cluster weapons and unexploded ordnance.

Medical Association for the Prevention of War – Dr Amanda Ruler (November 15, 2016)


Current field of health care: Gerontology and palliative care Special areas of interest: Amanda has long term interests in global sustainability, peace promotion, justice, human rights and the impact of war

We were very happy to have Amanda come and tell us about the work of MAPW.

The aims of MAPW are to prevent the death and suffering, and to relieve the suffering, which arises from war and the preparation for war, including civil conflict. Their main focus is on weapons of mass destruction. With respect to nuclear weapons, MAPW set up the International Campaign Against Nuclear Weapons, (ICAN) in 2006. Originally started in Melbourne, it is now a worldwide movement.

The group examined both the preamble and the 30 articles, to reaffirm its importance in today's world.

At our January evening last year we studied the UN Charter, finding its words are still meaningful and relevant. This year's exercise complemented the relevance of the not only the UN Charter but also the continuing relevance of the UN in the daily lives of citizens, We were able to also observe how the UDHR offers the founding principles document on which the later protocols are based. Evatt 2017 brought together 102 students all stepping in to the shoes of countries on the security council in a mock session, debating issues from electoral interference, to the Responsibility to Protect – key factors defining international relations in this day and age.

In addition to being very busy running educational programs for high school students, the division has welcomed 16 new enthusiastic volunteers in to our UN Youth family. These new volunteers have dived straight into roles, officer positions, and volunteer opportunities.  - b. Doris Gioffre is the manager of The Abuse Prevention Program (APP) for Aged Rights Advocacy Service, Adelaide.
 - c. Anita Hale from the Education and Engagement Team at Consumer and Business Services.
 - d. Cathy Chong from Chinese Welfare Services of SA. Cathy was able to provide a perspective on the increasing number of Chinese seniors in South Australia, and the problems they encounter
 - e. All speakers gave us useful information on where/how to obtain help for the vulnerable elders. Main take home message-- Elder abuse is a violation of human rights.

Sister Connely spoke about her long and selfless work with women prisoners and their families. The film was followed by a meal prepared by members.

Report of activities to 30 June 2017

The Women's International League for Peace and Freedom (WILPF) is an international non-government organisation (NGO) working for peace, disarmament and social justice. The South Australian branch comprises a small but dedicated group of activists that works on both national and international issues. The following summary highlights our work over the last year.



A WILPF(SA) representative accompanied Tammy Franks (Greens MLC) to a Briefing with the Minister for Corrections on conditions at Adelaide Women's Prison, early in 2016. In April 2017, we were advised that the Select Committee of Inquiry into SA's Prisons, of which Ms Franks is a member, would visit the Prison on 8 June. We then sent a letter to Ms Franks with details of the current situation to encourage the Select Committee to ask pertinent questions during its visit.

September 2016: Made a submission on domestic violence to the South Australian Attorney General's Department.

Represented WILPF at an event organised by Graham F Smith Peace Foundation to mark the UN International Day of Peace (UNAA also represented at this event). Attended a Peace Convergence in Alice Springs organised by Independent & Peaceful Australia Network (IPAN), which included a protest at the gates of the Pine Gap Joint Defence Facility.

October 2016: Made a second submission to SA

Nuclear Fuel Cycle Royal Commission, with subsequent monitoring of the Commission's findings and community reactions. WILPF's campaign closed after the Citizen's Jury did not support an international high-level nuclear dump in South Australia.

November 2016: Wrote to Adelaide City Council supporting a motion for the Council to investigate establishing a domestic violence memorial in Adelaide.

December 2016: Recorded with sadness the passing of long-term WILPF member Coralie Nichols who spent much of her life quietly working for the human rights and safety of the world and its people across a wide range of issues. Coralie had also been a long-term member and volunteer with UNAA SA.

February – June 2017: Wrote to the Prime Minister urging the Australian Government take part in United Nations negotiations, beginning March 2017, to abolish nuclear weapons. Following receipt of response, wrote another letter to the Prime Minister urging the Australian Government take part in the second round of negotiations beginning June 2017.
